WEAVING WITH WILLOW -A TALK & DEMO. WITH ELLIE MORGAN



Our expert Shop Manager, Peter Blake is there to help you with your purchases. Peter is usually on the allotment most mornings (on the immaculate plot 119), and around at weekends. For new plot holders he's also got some great advice about growing fruit and veg if you need it.

RUGBY PARKING

Our main stream of income comes from the Rugby Parking, but we can't open the gates without the commitment of volunteers. Namely YOU! We will notify you of the next match as they come up in the calendar, please consider giving up even an hour of your time.



Amongst other things, no income means no BBQs, Fireworks, an unpaid water bill (the cost will be passed on to you), money to pay for new equipment, toilet hire.....the list goes on.

JOBS FOR FEBRUARY - MARCH

Although the allotment is sodden, planting is difficult and we're all waiting for a patch of drier, warmer weather to arrive. There are still a few jobs you might contemplate doing. For newcomers here are a few ideas...

PRUNE AUTUMN RASPBERRIES

By pruning the old canes of autumn-fruiting raspberries now, you'll give the new, developing shoots plenty of time to grow, strengthen and able to hold the fruit crop. Prune old canes back to the ground, avoiding any new shoots that may be emerging. Now is also the time to plant raspberries.

PLANT RHUBARB

For the best crop of rhubarb, choose a bright, open position and prepare the soil by digging deeply and incorporating plenty of compost. Plant the crowns so that the buds are at the same level as soil surface (you may need to dig quite deeply to achieve this). Firm in well. Let the plants establish for two years before harvesting. In order to keep the plants healthy and productive, rhubarb should be lifted and divided every five or six years during the winter, (when the plant is dormant). Each plant can be split into three or four separate crowns with a spade, and replanted.

CLEAR OUT YOUR SHED OR GREENHOUSE

It's still pouring with rain and the ground is just too wet to dig? Take a morning to have a spring clean. Wash out flowerpots, oil all your tools, and sharpen your secateurs. Start the year with a spring clean. Keeping tools and greenhouses clean also helps to limit the spread of plant diseases.

And finally... A BOOK RECOMMENDATION

Had your fill of the usual books on growing fruit? Need all you need to know about pruning blackcurrants? Why not try this recommendation: 'Minding My Peas and Cucumbers', by Kay Sexton (Published by Summersdale). One woman's story of life on an allotment. Full of tales about hosepipe standoffs, arcane rules, and the dark arts of competitive vegetable growing (sound familiar?)!

Witty, well observed and with mouthwatering recipes. Recommended.
